


The First People in North America

Used resources but did not abuse the resource








The Roots of Abuse




The Beginnings



- President Harrison
- Passed a law stating that the President could set aside lands for national parks and national forests
- Extremely crucial legislation for the environment

Early Leaders

- John Muir (1838-1914: Sierra Club, "Father of National Parks"
- Gifford Pinchot (1865 1946): 1st Chief U.S. Forester
- Theodore Roosevelt (1901 — 1909): Boone and
 - Crocket Club
- Reclamation Act: put Powell's ideas into effect




Decline of Private Lands






Franklin D Roosevelt and Renewed Conservation Initiatives

Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) — planted trees, erosion control, nature trails, etc.


Federal program to give the unemployed men jobs during the depression


- Rocky Mtn. District

 - Over 13 million acres of nat'l forests



















Awakening of Environmental Philosophy

The part of Cleveland through which the Cuyahoga River runs is still highly industrialized, but today the water is much cleaner than it once was




